2021 Key Parent Findings




## Background:

Dates of Research: Fielded September 7th to 27th, 2021

Nationwide sample of 1,481 parents and guardians with children in public school, grades K-12.


#### **Parent Involvement**

- Parents say they will be as or more involved in their children's education (93%), even after an
  unprecedented year of off-the-charts engagement in their children's education. Parents are most likely
  to involve themselves in their child's assignments and to participate in conferences.
- Parents prioritize getting a better understanding of what is expected of their child (86%) and seeking a better understanding of where their child is academically (85%).



# Parent Priorities for 2021-2022 School Year

• Safety of students and staff, ademic progress, mental health, and emotional well-being are the top priorities for parents and educators this year.




# **Parent Major Concerns For School Year**

Among children's happiness and health, politicians being involved in curriculum is at the top
of parent concerns.

## **School Communications and Student Achievement**

- For school communications, parents prioritize direct and truthful information about performance (87%) and having a clear picture of their child's achievement (85%)
  - **Teachers** agree, saying that the most important priorities for communications are making sure parents have a clear picture of their child's academics (85%) and building trust (84%).
  - Principals also rank providing parents with a clear picture as their top priority for family engagement (82%).



 Gap continues between parent and teacher perceptions of achievement. More than nine out of ten parents (92%) believe their child is on grade level, regardless of race, income, or education level. Meanwhile 44% of teachers say most of their students are ready for grade level work this year.
